A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

As we enter the new year and reflect on our activities and accomplishments of 2022, it is clear to me that our productivity during the past twelve months has contributed to growth and stability for many farm enterprises across the state. During 2022, the Center's staff provided leadership in the Dairy Business Innovation Initiative, specialty crop marketing, farmers market Boot Camp workshops, agritourism, Farm and Ferment, value-added producer grant workshops, and teamed up with colleagues from three other states in submitting a five-year USDA Food Business Center proposal. In addition, we continued collaborative outreach with UT Southern, developed additional programs and collaborations in the value-added beverage space, conducted a strategic planning retreat, and developed a plan for celebrating the Center's twenty-fifth anniversary in 2023. Rachel Painter joined our team as a marketing specialist, Hal Pepper retired, two Extension assistant positions were added, and several of us transitioned from interim roles. The Center also formally created an AgrAbility Team when Eileen Legault and Joetta White joined the Center in June. We also experienced changes with other colleagues and program partners as Justin Rhinehart became assistant dean for



agriculture and natural resources Extension programs, Eric Mayberry became president of the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation, Andy Holt took on new responsibilities with Tennessee Department of Agriculture (TDA) Business Development, and Jeff Aiken was named deputy commissioner of TDA. The programs we implemented and the partnerships we cultivated in 2022 will strengthen our work and success in 2023. Speaking of 2023, we are in full swing with workshops, consultations, and collaborations related to value-added dairy, meat marketing, cut flowers, Farm and Ferment, training sessions for Extension agents, AgrAbility, Sustainable Agriculture, and the Pick TN Conference. We are busy folks, and I hope our paths cross with you soon as we travel the state doing our work.

After devoting more than thirty-seven years to Extension work, the Center for Profitable Agriculture's Hal Pepper retired November 30, 2022. Hal worked for twenty-five years as an Extension economist with Auburn University conducting farm financial analysis for central Alabama farmers. He came to the Center in February 2010 as a value-added financial specialist. Hal developed expertise with sales tax issues, founded the value-added producer grant workshops, molded the Farmers Market Boot Camp and Farmers Market Manager Training programs, laid the groundwork for Tennessee's Dairy Business Innovation Initiative, and helped simplify tricky regulatory issues including poultry processing exemptions. Hal has been a trusted friend to many and has positively impacted Tennessee farm families and the agriculture industry. Tennessee Extension Professional Development Conference Poster Session

to highlight an area of work that has had an impact on program participants. The four categories for posters were Extension Agriculture and Natural Resources, Extension Family and Consumer Sciences, Extension 4-H and Community Economic Development. Placing first

in the Community Economic Development division was Megan Leffew, Center for Profitable Agriculture Extension specialist III and Mark Morgan, Department of Food Science, with their poster "Helping Tennessee Farmers Evaluate and Implement New Enterprises and Marketing Strategies." Vines to Wines In-Service Training Sponsored by Tennessee Farm Winegrowers Alliance

Through a partnership with the Tennessee Farm Winegrowers Alliance, Center for Profitable Agriculture marketing specialist Rachel Painter facilitated an in-service training Friday, September 23. UT Extension Monroe County agent Jonathan Rhea and the Extension Fruit and Vegetable Workgroup assisted with hosting the daylong training in Madisonville, Tennessee. At the event, twenty-one Extension agents and specialists learned about producing and marketing muscadines. The training

included presentations by Extension specialist and professor Dave Lockwood on production and harvest decisions, Rachel Painter on marketing grapes and wine in



Tennessee, and a demonstration of grape harvest equipment on-site at Tsali Notch Vineyard. Vineyard owner Cary Cox and the Alliance's Executive Director Laura Swanson shared information about the new Tennessee Wine Trail and Wineries of Tennessee Startup Guide. A second In-service training will take place on February 9 and 10 in West Tennessee to continue these efforts to provide Extension agents with opportunities to learn and connect with the grape and wine industry in Tennessee.



Farmers Market Manager Training Webinar



Forty-six participants from thirty-two counties took part in the UT Extension Farmers Market Manager Training webinar on December 2. The program included information about best practices for market managers, funding opportunities, and the produce safety program. The program concluded with a panel discussion featuring the Tennessee Association of Farmers Markets, the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, and UT Extension. Visit to World Dairy Expo

Hal Pepper and Shep Stearns, value-added dairy Extension specialist, attended the World Dairy Expo in Madison, Wisconsin, on October 5-6. They also toured several dairy farms and creameries in the surrounding area as part of a scouting trip for a 2023 bus tour next fall.



Value-Added Foods Presentation at Tennessee Local Food Summit

Megan Leffew teamed up with Patricia Szappanos-Hart from the Tennessee Department of Agriculture Consumer and Industry Services to teach a session at the Tennessee Local Food Summit on December 2 in Lebanon, Tennessee. The session called Creating Value-Added Products covered an introduction to value-added agriculture, steps to analyzing and developing a value-added enterprise, and information about the new Tennessee Food Freedom Act and food manufacturing regulations. Nineteen people attended the session.
