Hosted by the Farm & Forest Families of Tennessee, this annual event celebrates National Egg Day each year. Approximately 100 individuals were in attendance for the 2025 event held at the Governor's residence.

Extension specialist Kortni Blalock represented the Center at the 2025 Northeast Tennessee Beef Expo held at the Clyde Austin 4-H Center in Greeneville on October 16. Blalock shared about value-added resources and programming from the Center while staffing an exhibit on display to over 100 individuals in attendance.

## Tennessee Farmer of the Year Program Revitalized

The Tennessee Farmer of the Year award program has been reimagined for 2026. An annual recognition developed collaboratively by UT Extension and the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation that began in 1990, the Farmer of the Year program recognized one outstanding farmer each year until 2024. Serving as chair of the steering committee, Center director Rob Holland has been heavily involved in the rebranding and development of the revitalized state program.

Beginning in 2026, one finalist from each of the state's grand divisions will be chosen for consideration for the award. Of those three finalists, only one will be named farmer of the year.

The Tennessee Farmer of the Year is expected to make a number appearances at various agricultural events, including the Tennessee State Fair, UT Institute of Agriculture's annual Ag Day celebration, Tennessee Farm Bureau Annual Meeting, and more.



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### Mooneyham Educates on Value-Added at Maple School

Extension Specialist Liz Mooneyham took part in the first annual Maple School held at the UT Extension Office in Sullivan County on November 14 and 15. The two-day educational event brought together maple syrup producers from across the region to learn about best practices in maple production, from tapping and sap collection to finishing and bottling.

Mooneyham gave a presentation on opportunities in value-added agriculture for maple syrup producers alongside Mark Morgan, professor and processing Extension specialist at the University of Tennessee. Their session explored value-added opportunities for maple syrup producers, including regulatory considerations and marketing strategies for small-scale producers looking to expand their product offerings.

The event drew forty attendees and featured hands-on demonstrations at Maple Grove Farm of Afton, as well as presentations from industry experts and university faculty. Other topics included equipment for small-scale production, sap collection and storage, alternative tree syrups, forest management, and cooking with maple products.

## Value-Added Producer Grant Workshop Held in December

Thirty value-added producers (in-person or online) attended the Insight to Developing a Strong Application for the USDA Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) workshop held in Rutherford County on December 11. This workshop was designed to help producers with value-added enterprises develop their application for this grant. A total of fifty-one participants joined the program, attending either the live session in Murfreesboro or virtually via Zoom.

Producers received an overview of the grant program, received tips for developing a strong application, heard from recent recipients of the grant, went through the new on-line application portal and were informed of the scoring criteria used with each application.

## Interactive Map - Center Quarterly Activity by County


